

Museum Ambassador Report

(Visuality)

September 11, 2001: A Global Moment is a major exhibition that explores the global, personal and historical significance of September 11, 2001. The exhibition includes

rare and important artifacts from the World Trade Center after the collapse, a timeline that traces the events of the day, personal stories and objects, images, interactive programs and media about the everyday life and the aftermath. Visitors will gain a clearer understanding about the events of September 11, people whose lives were lost and use the exhibition as a platform to share their experiences about September 11.

A Global Moment is a major exhibition, approximately 8000 square feet in size, including over 100 important artifacts from the World Trade Center, victims, survivors, the aircraft and the international response from the collection of the New York State Museum. Included are hundreds of photographs, media, a rescue vehicle destroyed on 9/11, and compelling objects, expressions of sympathy from New York, such as the Times Square scrolls, memorial fences and missing posters, that bring to the visitor the powerful human response to the attacks.

The events of September 11, 2001 are explained through images, recovered artifacts, videos, a full timeline and personal stories. Within the exhibit, you'll find items that help explain the story, such as:

- American flag from one of the WTC towers
- Building fragments

- Signs
- Flight attendant uniform
- New York Police Department (NYPD) shield
- Firefighters helmet
- Port Authority of New York and New Jersey police jeep
- Portion of August Rodin's "The Three Shades" sculpture
- Nino's Restaurant's Statue of Liberty (was placed on a nearby sidewalk to inspire the rescue effort)

Dead Sea Scrolls and Lunch Cruise

More than 30 Cowtown Vette members and their families saw the largest privately owned Dead Sea Scrolls collection ever to be on display outside Israel Aug. 4. Some of the 21 fragments of scrolls had never before been exhibited. The Dead Sea Scrolls Exhibit at the MacGorman Performing Arts Center and chapel of Fort Worth's Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary was followed by a cruise to Waxahachie for lunch at the Twisted Frog.

At the Dead Sea Scrolls exhibit members viewed a video about the history of how the Fort Worth seminary obtained the largest collection of scrolls in the nation.



Dr. Bruce McCoy, director of the Dead Sea Scrolls Exhibit, was on hand to welcome some of the Cowtown members and was impressed by the lineup of Corvettes outside the chapel. Our guide, Erin, an archaeology major who had just returned

from a seminary-sponsored dig on the island of Cyprus,

showed a model of Jerusalem. We also saw ancient Bibles, including a 1611 first edition of the King James Bible. Some members put written prayers into the crevices of simulated rocks in a replica of the Western Wall, or Wailing Wall





as it is often called. The wall is a holy site in Jerusalem and is believed to be a retaining wall for the last Jewish temple, destroyed by the Romans in 70 A.D.

Don and Karyn Fowler had their grandchildren, Kathy and Ashley,

with them. Along with their grandparents, Kathy, 11, and Ashley, 6, visited the replica of Qumran, where the scrolls were first found by Bedouin goat herders in the 1940s.Kathy dug for some of the ancient hundreds of pieces of ancient pottery donated by the Smithsonian Institution which had been buried in the dirt. Also, old coins were buried there.

"One girl who dug unearthed an old column and was really excited about it," Karyn said. "The guide at the dig

said they could keep whatever they found, including old coins. She added: "I thought the tour was very interesting and amazing."

During the cruise members took photos of historical markers and courthouses in Cleburne and in Waxahachie. The route twisted through back roads and into Keene and other small communities.



GOVERNOR'S THOUGHTS



September always reminds me of school starting and cooler weather, but in Texas you never know if it will be cooler and school starts in August!

In rereading my August article, touching on points for all NCCC sanction events, I didn't mention that there are travel points for workers as well, starting in 2012. If you travel over 100 miles you get points for the travel the first event of the day. If you travel 100 miles from your club's home you receive 1 pt., if you travel over 200 you receive 2 pts; that continues

up to 9 pts. per day. I know points are somewhat confusing and if you have any questions about them, please see me and I will be more than willing to explain.

There are several types of events that can be sanctioned. They are as follows: (1) Speed Events—two types, low-speed and high speed. The low-speed is any autocross that allows a driver to learn, improve and demonstrate their driving skill on a course that is not subject to public traffic (ie a parking lot) that is set by cones or pylons. Low speed is under 80 mph for a Group 1 car, meaning a stock corvette. High speed is usually on a road course and very few cones or pylons. The course is designed to follow a track and only coned off if it is for safety. High speed is determined when a Group 1 car can reach 80mph or above. Our TMS event is on a road course but we cone it down to keep it a low-speed event.

- (2) Drag Racing is a wheel to wheel acceleration contest between two (2) cars on a sanctioned drag strip at least one eighth (1/8) mile in length. A drag race is a contest of nerves, skill and raw power.
- (3) Think of a Funkhana as a very low speed autocross-like event with the added features of a navigator to assist the driver and a variety of gimmicks that the driver and/or navigator must perform in order to successfully complete a run. The types of gimmicks that are included as parts of a timed run are only limited by the imagination of the Event Chairpersons as long as they are in good taste and done in the spirit of having fun (hence the name FUNkhana). A little friendly embarrassment of the entrants is okay and can make the Funkhana an exciting spectator event. The use of a corvette during each timed run is a requirement for a sanctioned event. Our September 29th Fall Corvette Scramble includes a Funkhana however you will not be "driving" a Corvette, you will start and end in a "common" Corvette.
- (4) Rallyes—there are three types:
- (A.) The Time-Speed-Distance Rallye is planned so that an entrant should never exceed a legal speed limit. Entrants are given a set of route instructions with average speeds to maintain. The Rallye is usually composed of a series of separately timed legs to avoid speeding near the end of the Rallye by the cars that are behind

Glenda McMahan 2012 NCCC Governor glenda-gm@att.net time. The Rallye will have a minimum of one checkpoint which are the centers of activity, set up by the Rallye officials, with facilities for timing cars as they arrive. This type of Rallye is scored on TIME ONLY -- not distance.

- (B.) A Gimmick Rallye is one in which the Rallyemaster presents route instructions and questions that the alert Rallyists must follow and answer along the Rallye route. The Rallyists can be required to test out their navigational abilities and match their wit and skill with the Rallyemaster. Answers to questions may be found on either side of the road. This Rallye is scored by following instructions, providing correct answers and being in by the pre-announced time given by the Rallyemasters in the "Generals" or at the Entrants Meeting. Our September 29th Fall Corvette Scramble includes this type of Rallye.
- (C.) Chance Rallies are fun Rallies. The usual navigational demands are minimized, courses are relatively simple, average speeds are readily obtainable or unnecessary. There are many varieties. This type of Rallye is scored by CHANCE requirements set up by the Rallyemaster. This is like a poker rallye. Our September 29th Fall Corvette Scramble includes this type of Rallye which will be run in conjunction with the Gimmick rallye.
- (5) Concours car show. There are two types of car shows a judged one but to make it a sanctioned event it has to use the NCCC Rulebook for judging. The second kind of car show is people choice, like our October car show. Our car show is NOT a NCCC event and you do not get points but you do have the opportunity to get a trophy. Entrants and spectators then vote for their favorite car in each Class. All entrants in a People's Choice Concours shall receive an equal number of entrant points (travel points can vary with the entrant).



Route 66 - Part 2

Here is another version of a Route 66 road trip. Mary Anne and I decided to spend Mother's Day 2012 visiting her in-laws (97 & 94 years

young) in Santa Monica, CA. We've done 2 wk road trips before and have perfected our technique in "sharing" the trunk – ½ each! We put all our clothes for the trip into 1 suitcase each (& leave them in the trunk) and then share an overnight bag with makeup, shaving stuff and a change of clothes each for the next day. Helpful Hint: How can I get the most points on my trip?

To get the most points possible on any trip you will need your cruiser log

sheet and a map. Once you have your final destination selected, look at the map to see if there is a more interesting or back roads route. Even if you take an interstate highway there are side roads to cities and sites that may only be a few miles off the interstate. Once you have a route selected look at your log sheet to see what letters you need. Using this as a guide, review your route to find locations that provide those letters. Most maps also show county lines. With a little effort at reading the map you can estimate when you might cross into a county and will be prepared to stop for your picture. County seats with courthouses and historical markers are designated with a black circle. It is often safer and more interesting to take the time to go to the county seat. With a little planning you will capture more points and will reduce the times you say "we should have stopped for that sign" as you speed past it. You can circle the sites on your map or make a list to follow as you read the map on your journey. We used this method on our recent trip to Colorado and NCCC convention in Topeka, KS. It was very helpful and allowed us to get the most points possible without backtracking. When you are cruising the journey IS the trip.

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
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called; time now to drive the GS back to the hotel in the rain and call it a night.


